Your Excellency, *Foreign Office, S.W. 1,*
30th June, 1950.

I have the honour to affirm the understanding which was reached during the negotiation of the Cultural Convention between the Government of the United Kingdom and the Government of Brazil, signed at Rio de Janeiro on 16th April, 1947;⁽¹⁾ namely, that nothing in the provisions of the Convention shall be deemed to affect the obligation of any person to comply with the laws and regulations of either country concerning the entry and residence of foreigners.

If this is also the view of the Brazilian Government, I have the honour to suggest that the present Note and your Excellency's reply to that effect be regarded as placing on record the understanding between the Contracting Governments in this matter.

I have the honour to acknowledge your Note of 30th June last, in which your Excellency affirms the understanding which was reached during the negotiation of the Cultural Convention between the Government of Brazil and the Government of the United Kingdom, signed at Rio de Janeiro on 16th April, 1947: namely, that nothing in the provisions of the Convention shall be deemed to affect the obligation of any person to comply with the laws and regulations of either country, concerning the entry and residence of foreigners.
