Excellency,

London, 1st June, 1951.

I have the honor to refer to the Exchange of Notes of 1st December, 1948(1), constituting an Agreement between His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Government of the United States of America (hereinafter, as modified by a further Exchange of Notes of 23rd February-7th April, 1951(2); referred to as "the principal Agreement") for the purpose of giving effect to Article VI, paragraph 2, read with Article IV, paragraph 5, of the Economic Co-operation Agreement between the two Governments signed at London on 6th July, 1948(3), and to propose that the principal Agreement shall be terminated and cease to apply as regards all relief goods, packages and packs of which the bills of lading are dated after 30th April, 1951. The Government of the United Kingdom would then not be called upon to accord duty-free treatment to such goods, packages and packs on entry into the United Kingdom, or any territory to which the principal Agreement has been extended under paragraph 6 thereof, or to defray the costs of transportation from the point of entry, unless a new agreement were made under Article VI, paragraph 2, of the Economic Co-operation Agreement.

2. If these proposals are acceptable to the Government of the United Kingdom, I have the honor to suggest that this Note and your Excellency's reply to that effect shall constitute an Agreement on the above terms between the two Governments.
