EXCHANGE OF NOTES BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND AND THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNION OF BURMA AMENDING THE UNITED KINGDOM SCHEDULE OF ROUTES ANNEXED TO THE AIR TRANSPORT AGREEMENT OF THE 25th OF OCTOBER, 1952

Her Majesty's Ambassador at Rangoon to the Burmese Minister for Foreign Affairs

British Embassy,

Your Excellency,

Rangoon, August 4, 1953.

I have the honour to refer to the Air Transport Agreement between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Government of the Union of Burma, signed at Rangoon on the 25th of October, 1952,⁽¹⁾ and to inform you that the Government of the United Kingdom propose that Route 1 of the United Kingdom Schedule of Routes annexed to that Agreement should be amended to read as follows:—

<i>Points of Departure</i>	<i>Intermediate Points</i>	<i>Terminal or Transversing Points in Burma</i>	<i>Points Beyond Burma</i>
Points in United Kingdom	A point in Germany. A point in Switzerland or Malta, and/ or a point in Italy or Libya: points in the Middle East, Pakistan and India.	Rangoon (or) Mandalay	(a) Bangkok, Singapore, points in Indonesia, points in Australia. (b) Bangkok or points in Indo-China, Hong Kong, a point in the Philippines. Points in China, points in Japan.

If this proposal is acceptable to the Government of the Union of Burma, I have the honour to suggest that this Note and your Excellency's reply in that sense should be regarded as constituting an agreement between the two Governments in this matter which shall enter into force immediately.
