WHALING— International Convention for the Regulation of Whaling Accession— Norway (with declaration*) * "The continued adherence of the Norwegian Government to the Convention is dependent upon the following conditions being fulfilled: (1) That the Government of the Netherlands adheres to the Convention, (2) That the Government of the USSR maintains its pledge of November 1958, to limit the catch of the Soviet expeditions' share of the total quota established by the International Whaling Commission to 20 per cent. annually for a seven-year period, (3) That an agreement is reached within reasonable time on the division of the remaining 80 per cent. of the total quota between Norway, Japan, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom. The Norwegian Government at the same time wishes to emphasise the vital importance of reaching an agreement between the countries engaged in pelagic whaling in Antarctic waters on an international inspection system for the observance of the regulations drawn up by the International Whaling Commission." On December 29, 1961, the Norwegian Government notified its conditional withdrawal from the Convention but declared that its notice of withdrawal would be cancelled should an agreement concerning the distribution of the whaling quota be signed by Norway, the Netherlands, Japan, the Soviet Union and the United Kingdom prior to July 1, 1962. This notice of withdrawal was cancelled on June 6, 1962, when the Arrangements for the Regulation of Antarctic Pelagic Whaling were signed ("Miscellaneous No. 26 (1962)", Cmnd. 1817).
