Your Excellency,

I have the honour to refer to the Treaty between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United States of America concerning the Cayman Islands Relating to Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters signed at Grand Cayman, Cayman Islands on 3 July 1986¹, and to inform the Government of the United States of America that the Governments of Anguilla, the British Virgin Islands and the Turks and Caicos Islands have confirmed that they wish the provisions of this Treaty to be applicable to their territory. In accordance with the Protocol to the Treaty the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland accordingly wish to propose that the Treaty shall be made applicable to Anguilla, the British Virgin Islands and the Turks and Caicos Islands, and that the central authorities for the purpose of assistance under this Treaty shall be the Attorney General or a person designated by him for Anguilla and the British Virgin Islands, the Magistrate or such other person designated by the Chief Justice for the Turks and Caicos Islands, and the Attorney General or a person designated by him for the United States.

2. If this proposal is acceptable to the Government of the United States of America, I have the honour to propose that this Note and Your Excellency's reply to that effect shall constitute an Agreement between the two Governments which shall enter into force on the date of Your Excellency's reply.

3. I avail myself of this opportunity to extend to Your Excellency the assurance of my highest consideration.
