(b) The Argentine Republic retains unabated its legal title and rights to these territories, and specifies that the provision in article 20 (1) of the Universal Postal Convention for the use of postage stamps in the country of origin will not be considered mandatory by that Republic when such stamps distort the geographical and legal facts on which the Argentine Republic's case is based. REFUGEES (continued)-The provisions of Articles 8 and 9 shall not be interpreted as forbidding the Malagasy Government to take, in time of war or other grave and exceptional circumstances, measures with regard to a refugee because of his nationality in the interests of national security. The provisions of Article 17 cannot be interpreted as preventing the application of the laws and regulations establishing the proportion of alien workers that employers are authorised to employ in Madagascar or affecting the obligations of such employers in connection with the employment of alien workers. The instrument of accession is accompanied by a declaration made in accordance with section B(1) of Article 1 to the effect that the words " events occurring before 1 January, 1951 ", in Article 1, section A, shall be understood to mean "events occurring in Europe before 1 January, 1951".
