Le 28 Septembre dernier, M. le Dr. Hendrik P. N. Muller van Rijekevorsel, Consul-Général de l'État Libre d'Orange à La Haye, a remis au Conseil Fédéral, au nom de son Gouvernement, l'Acte d'Accession de cet Etat à la Convention, conclue à Genève le 22 Août, 1864, pour l'amélioration du sort des blessés dans les armées en campagne (Croix-Rouge).

On the 28th September last, Dr. Hendrik P. N. Muller van Rijekevorsel, Consul-General of the Orange Free State at the Hague, communicated to the Federal Council, in the name of his Government, the Act of Accession of that State to the Convention, concluded at Geneva on the 22nd of August, 1864, for the amelioration of the condition of the wounded in armies in the field (Red Cross Convention).
